- Dr. Lowell Lo has been selected as one of the six finalists in the 2016 ASN Innovations in Kidney Education Contest.
- ❖ Dr. Mitchell Lunn (and his colleague Dr. Juno Obedin-Maliver) received the 2016 GETy Diversity Award. This award focuses on participant-centered research and is funded by the Robert Wood Johnson Foundation (http://www.getconference.org/get2016/gety-awards-release.html)
- Dr. Cynthia Delgado received a VA Innovators Network Pilot Grant, as the project director in which she will test the use of ultrasound to screen for muscle wasting in the VA CKD clinics.
- Dr. Ruth Dubin received a RAP Pilot for Junior Investigators for her project titled "Doxycycline: a Novel Treatment for Cardiorenal Syndrome"
- ❖ For the third year in a row, UC San Francisco's four schools topped the nation in federal biomedical research funding in their fields in 2015. The UCSF School of Medicine topped the list of NIH funding for medical schools for the fourth year in a row, at \$501.1 million, supporting research, graduate student training and fellowships for postdoctoral scholars. The UCSF schools of Pharmacy, Dentistry and Nursing also ranked first in their fields in NIH grants for 2015: Pharmacy for the 36th consecutive year, with \$27.0 million in grants; Dentistry for the 24th year, with \$16.9 million; and Nursing for the 10th time in the last dozen years, with \$14.0 million.
